Dear Resident,

You want to see your Council Tax making a difference to the lives of everyone across Staffordshire, paying for care for older people, keeping the roads safe, and supporting business and jobs.

The county council has now agreed its spending priorities for the year ahead in what has been the toughest budget I have been involved in setting.

While nationally there is less money from government, we have more demand for the support we provide, especially from our growing, ageing population. Despite this, the county council will spend almost **£300m** next year caring for older people, people with disabilities and children at risk of harm. This is more than we have ever spent on care before.

To make sure we spend taxpayers' money on the things that make the biggest difference in our residents' lives, we have reduced our costs by almost £200million over the last 7 years. And in that time more jobs have been created, more children are better prepared to start school, and exam results have gone up.

Here you can find out how we spend your money and how we are managing increasing demand from Staffordshire's changing population.

Greater demand for health and care services is a national problem. The Government has recognised this by agreeing to a **3% increase in Council Tax** to spend only on care, on top of the **1.95 percent rise** already planned. This will see bills rise by just over **£1 a week** for a Band D home.

We need to ask you for more to help pay for the care of those, young and old, who need it most. We want county Council Tax levels in Staffordshire to remain one of the lowest in England while making sure our people get the services they need.

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More demand, falling income

Our funding is changing

By 2020/21 our government grant will fall to zero with services only funded by local Council Tax and business rates.



An ageing population

As the number of older people rises, there will be fewer people of working age to support them.







In 2006 there were 138,017 Staffordshire residents aged over 65 and 15,752 aged over 85. By 2016 this has increased to 183,600 aged over 65 (a 33% increase) and 22,000 aged over 85 (a 40% increase)

Living in Staffordshire

Here are some of the highlights for our county over the past year.



- Staffordshire's crime rate per 1,000 people is lower than the England average
- 94% of residents are satisfied with their area as a place to live
- 99% feel safe outside during the day and around 85% after dark, which is consistent with or better than national averages

Jobs and Growth

- 79% of the county's adults have a job which is better than the average for England
- The number of available jobs grew steadily between 2008 and 2014, and by 2020, there could be around 38,000 additional jobs
- Less than 1% of the county's working age population claim Jobseeker's Allowance, lower than national and West Midlands averages

- 55% of pupils in 2015/16 achieved five or more GCSEs at A* to C, including English and Maths, higher than the national average
- Over 9,400 apprenticeships were started in 2015-16 (Source: The Department of Education and Skills Funding Agency)

Health and Wellbeing

- Health overall across Staffordshire is improving with life expectancy continuing to rise
- Fewer babies are born with low birth weight in Staffordshire than the average for England
- Fewer Staffordshire five-year-olds have tooth decay than the average
- The county has better take-up of key inoculations diphtheria, tetanus, polio, measles, mumps and rubella – than most parts of the country
- Preventable death rates in Staffordshire have fallen and are lower than England as a whole




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Where our £1,089m income comes from

There are six general sources from which the County Council gets its annual funding. Your Council Tax makes up just over a quarter of the funding we receive. Over a third comes from Government for schools. We hand this money directly to the schools and have no control over how it's used.




^{*} These contributions make up our available funds for day-to-day services.

Our total income is £1,089m. Over half of this money is passed onto schools or can only be spent on specific services or projects, such as building new business parks. This leaves the county council with £490m to fund our day-to-day services.

Making the most of your money

More than 60% of your Council Tax pays to look after older people, vulnerable adults and children, and this figure is rising every year. We also use your money to bring more investment and jobs to Staffordshire, maintain roads and provide waste disposal. We will continue to work with the NHS, emergency services and others to ensure that public money spent in Staffordshire delivers the biggest possible impact.
